Background to the National Key Scheme

The availability of appropriately designed toilets in public places is vital for disabled people to engage in the everyday life of their communities and to take part in the full range of activities. This was recognised from the earliest days of campaigns for improved access to toilets in this country.

By the late 1970s, most local authorities and some other public bodies had provided public toilets designed or adapted for disabled people. However, it had become evident that in some parts of the country these were being damaged either by deliberate vandalism or more casual misuse.

To counter this vandalism, an increasing number of public toilets were being locked with keys held by attendants. A few councils had issued keys to disabled people on a local basis, however, it became clear that the construction of new public conveniences for disabled people was actually being held back by the absence of a uniform system of controlling entry.

The national disability charity, RADAR (see page 7), had held the view that public toilets for disabled people should be unlocked and kept in a usable condition at all times. Toilets can become unusable by disabled people even if there is only a low level of damage or lack of maintenance, for example, wheelchair users may not be able to avoid broken glass that others can step over.

With regret, RADAR recognised that in many areas the two elements of its policy had become irreconcilable. It therefore set up discussions with disability organisations, local authorities and others to establish the National Key Scheme (NKS) to increase the security and encourage proper usage of accessible toilets.

The principle of the scheme is that if it is necessary to lock toilets for disabled people, a standard lock should be used. Local authorities adopting the scheme should make arrangements for disabled people in its area to obtain a key. The same lock can be used by the many other organisations providing toilets used by disabled members of the public.

The National Key Scheme was launched at the beginning of 1981. By the end of the first year, NKS locks had been fitted to about 100 toilets. However, during the second year the lock was fitted at 40 major railway stations, making the scheme truly national, and the 100th local authority had adopted the scheme by the end of 1983.

Since the mid-1980s, the number of toilets fitted with the lock has grown by about 300 per year. The scheme has become an ordinary part of provision in most parts of the country.

The current listing of NKS toilets includes well over 6000 toilets in all parts of the country provided by over 400 local authorities and an increasingly wide range of other organisations.





The Design and Use of Accessible Toilets

The current design recommendations for a unisex public toilet have focused on the features that are required for wheelchair users and people who can walk only a short distance.

The approach must be level or ramped, the doorway must be level and of an adequate width and the dimensions large enough for wheelchair manoeuvre to allow for different directions of transfer to the toilet and for personal assistance if this is required.

The fact that some disabled people will need assistance from a companion necessitates a unisex cubicle. The recommended layout of fittings aims to cater for the maximum possible range of requirements for handrails.

The provision of well-designed public unisex toilets designed for disabled people does not mean there is no need to pay attention to the design and maintenance of other toilets. Simple fittings such as a handrail in at least one toilet cubicle and by a urinal would help a large number of people.

RADAR

RADAR, the Royal Association for Disability and Rehabilitation, oversees the National Key Scheme. RADAR is a national disability organisation, working to represent the needs and expectations of disabled people throughout the country.



How to Use the Listings in This Booklet

The public toilets listed in this booklet are those that are fitted with the National Key Scheme lock – it is not a list of all public toilets designed for disabled people in Nottinghamshire. In general, the entries in this guide are unisex toilets designed for disabled people that are available to NKS keyholders at all times. The listings are alphabetical by district.

Some toilets are not available at all times; they may be within premises that are closed overnight (ie public houses).

Most toilets fitted with the NKS lock are run by district or borough councils in whose area they are located. However, an increasing proportion are now provided by other organisations. These include other local authorities such as parish and county councils, commercial bodies including shopping centres, public houses and rail companies, and a wide variety of other public and voluntary organisations.

Who can obtain a key?

Any individual who has a disability and is able to provide evidence of this, for example, a blue badge. This is required under current VAT legislation.



How can I obtain a key?

Contact your local authority or obtain one from Dial Mansfield & District. Keys may be collected from the Dial office (cost: £2.50), or by post (cost: £3.90, including postage and packing). Requests by post should be sent to the address below with the remittance, delivery address details and photocopy of proof of disability. Cheques should be made payable to 'Disability Nottinghamshire.
